As I write this newsletter article, we are being told that winter weather is due this coming weekend. It has been an unusually nice fall. Winter always seems to be shorter if we don't have a huge snowfall before Halloween. Also with Election Day about as late in November as it could possibly be, it is nice to have good weather on that day too.

Since I am addressing weather, we could not have had a more perfect summer this year or last year for the construction of the Roundabout near City Hall last year and this year the construction of the new bridge over the railroad and U. S. Highway 12 and the building of the new corridor to bring County Road 92 north and south together. October 31st, the day of the ribbon cutting and opening of County



Road 92 could not have been a more beautiful fall day. No more detours!

Neither Representative Jerry Hertaus nor Senator David Osmek ran for office this fall, but they were responsible for getting the funding through the Legislature to get the County Road 92 project built. If you see them, thank them!

Because of the beautiful fall weather, all farm and garden harvesting has been completed. Because it is so dry, it is almost impossible for farmers to chisel plow their corn and soybean field acreage. This will affect next year's crop production, but until we have snow on the ground, we have had a real fire danger, too.

Election Day is past and hopefully all the political road signs have been removed, much less mail is being delivered and the TV and radio campaign commercials have ended. Thanks for voting! It is a privilege and responsibility we should ALL take seriously. Now we need to renew our commitment to working together with our newly elected people for the betterment of our community and country. Redistricting will not happen

again for another ten years.

I mentioned earlier about the danger of fire and also Redistricting. For the last couple of years our council has been involved with other cities in talking about "Fire Contracts" and "Fire Districts" and cost containment and areas covered by each fire department. Nothing has changed at this point, but the Loretto and Hamel Fire Departments (both private departments) are discussing the possibility of merging.

Also, beginning before the end of the year, North Memorial Ambulance Service, will be making our new Public Safety/Public Works building a local home for them.

The City Council, Staff, and Department Heads have been busy working on our City Budget for next year. We are very conscience of the fact of major valuation increases, so you will see a reduction in the rate from previous years. The final budget will be approved at a December Council Meeting.

Enjoy the fall festivities of Thanksgiving, special dinners, concerts, View Santa, family gatherings, trips and Christmas. Stay healthy and safe too!

### 2023 Preliminary Budget Information

Every year cities in Minnesota are required to adopt a preliminary tax levy and budget by September 30<sup>th</sup> for the following year. Cities then have until December 31<sup>st</sup> to adopt a final tax levy and budget. The City of Independence City Council adopted the 2023 **Preliminary** General Fund Tax Levy and Budget at the September 20<sup>th</sup> Regular City Council Meeting. The City Council will consider adoption of the final budget at the first City Council meeting in December . There are several key elements of the preliminary budget that should be noted:

- City Council has adopted a preliminary budget that significantly lowers the applicable municipal tax rate from 39% to 32%, as a result of operating an efficient and value driven local government. This 7% reduction in the City's tax rate will equate to a corresponding reduction in City taxes on an equal valued home year over year. Prior to this year's reduction, Independence has held a flat tax rate since 2016 with no increases.
- The City of Independence has worked with West Hennepin Public Safety to increase police department funding to ensure officer retention, competitive compensation and continued investment in capital needs.

- The City continues to increase its cash reserve balance to be at or slightly above auditor recommended levels.
- The City continues to maintain its debt service level while issuing debt to pay for key road, infrastructure and facility improvements.
- The City has established and continues to maintain long-range capital plans for equipment, roads, sewer and municipal facilities. This planning allows the City to budget and manage all capital needs.
- The City continues to fund capital equipment purchases with cash rather than through issuing additional debt. Long range capital planning allows the City to save cash for making capital purchases when necessary.
- The City has received an unmodified opinion for the state of the City's financials from its annual audit. This is the highest opinion that can be obtained.

The Truth and Taxation Meeting will be Tuesday, December 6<sup>th</sup> at 6 pm at the City Hall. All are welcome.



### Seasonal Parking Restrictions (City Ordinance 2018-04)


(a) From November 1 through April 15 of each year and between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m., it shall be unlawful to park or permit to be parked, or continue to park or permit to stand, any vehicle upon any city street.

### Following a Snow Fall of 3"

(b) Following a snow fall of 3 inches or more in depth, it shall be unlawful to park or permit to be parked, or to continue to park or permit to stand, any vehicle upon any street until the snow has been plowed from the street or the same has been otherwise disposed of. <a href="https://library.municode.com/mn/independence/">https://library.municode.com/mn/independence/</a> ordinances/code of ordinances?nodeld=930901



SEARCH ALL CITY ORDINANCES



The City does not allow obstructions to be located within the City's right-of-way, including but not limited to boulders, rocks, and other materials/structures that may impede safety or drainage. Invisible dog fences and irrigation heads or lines are also not allowed in the right-of-way. The City is not responsible for these items if they are damaged during routine maintenance and repair operations such as snow plowing and road and ditch repairs. The City may have to remove obstructions located within the right-of-way.

Having your property classified as homestead may lower your property taxes and qualify you for additional property tax refund from the Minnesota Department of Revenue.

### **Business Grants Available**

Hennepin County's Department of Environment and Energy offers resources and grant assistance for <u>business recycling</u>. This includes their <u>Bin and Compostable Bag Grant</u> up to \$3,000 in containers and bags, and their <u>Waste Prevention Grant</u> up to \$50,000 toward eligible waste prevention expenses.

### West Hennepin Public Safety announces the 2023 Citizens Police Academy



West Hennepin Public Safety's Citizens Police Academy will start February 16, 2023 and will end with graduation on April 6, 2022. The Academy runs for eight weeks, one day a week, Thursday nights, from 7:00 to 10:00 pm.

**WHAT IS IT?** The Citizens Police Academy is a FREE 24-hour block of instruction designed to give citizens knowledge about how your police department operates, our policies, procedures, programs, and challenges. In addition, you will be introduced to government officials and staff and learn about the responsibilities of their respective office. Participants in each session will commit to meeting 3 hours, one night a week for 8 weeks.



The Citizens Police Academy was designed to create a better understanding of law enforcement through education. The Citizens Police Academy participants are presented with realistic hands-on information, which will help each participant better understand the police department functions. The classroom and hands-on information covers: DWI and Traffic Enforcement, home security, personal security, use of force, including deadly force which includes a demonstration of the Taser Gun and FATS training (firearms simulation), Hennepin County Dispatch Center, Court procedures including testifying before a Judge and many other areas related to law enforcement. This is a great opportunity to meet your police officers, fellow citizens, and other members of government to learn why we do what we do. At graduation you will receive a certificate and become a member of the Citizens Academy Network Alumni.



### Tired of shoveling your driveway entrance a 2<sup>nd</sup> time after Public Works plows your street?

If so, clear the area to the left of your driveway! Note: It is against the law to dump, plow, or push snow from private driveways onto highway or city streets whether you are plowing your driveway or have hired someone to do so. Snow dumped on highways or street right-of-way can create a hazard not only for motorists but also for snowplows. Even our heavy snowplows have been ditched and damaged when hitting compacted and frozen snow, costing your tax dollars to repair! The person responsible for depositing snow on roadways may be liable in a civil lawsuit if damages or injuries occur as a result of this
