Kaltsas attended the following meetings:

7. Three Rivers Park District: District 1 Representative Marge Beard - Introduction, Park District Updates.

Marge Beard, Three Rivers Park District 1 Representative, introduced herself and provided background information on the Three Rivers Park District and initiatives in progress. She noted the district was formed 50 years ago. The mission is environmental stewardship through natural resources and the 29,000 acres of land they manage. Beard said the parks receive 12.5 million visitors per year. Wildlife management is facilitated though the District and a sample of those efforts is the reintroduction of trumpeter swans, ospreys and turtles. Beard said they currently are working on a project with the "Rusty Patch Bumble Bee" which is the state bee. The District has an extensive watercraft inspection program with over 200 staff members inspecting vessels for invasive species.

McCoy asked where the plan for the railroad viaduct was in the process. Beard said they are waiting on the railroad and do have money reserved for it. McCoy asked her thoughts on why the Public Safety was cut back in the parks. He said it puts a strain on our own Public Safety Department. Beard said they are focused on conservation-style officers. McCoy said that we receive a lot of calls as the number of conservation officers go down in the parks. Johnson said that the fire department has felt the strain as well. Spencer asked who was responsible for the policing of the parks. He mentioned the campground at Baker Park and if that would be policed or would it fall on West Hennepin Public Safety. He noted it is a burden on our taxpayers if our police are patrolling it.

Spencer said he really appreciated all the work the Three Rivers Park District has done in conjunction with various programs on water quality and he noted the great relationship that has been built with the District. He said the relationship is truly appreciated.

8. West Hennepin Public Safety Director, Gary Kroells, January 2020 Monthly Report.

Kroells stated there have been a total of 414 incident complaints as of January 31, 2020. 244 were in the City of Independence and 160 in the City of Maple Plain. Kroells stated there would be a Highway 12 Safety Coalition meeting on Thursday at 3:00 p.m.

Spencer asked about an exchange area for people wanting to do that type of thing (ex., Craigslist) where it could be safe and monitored like Medina does through their Police Department with a mounted camera. Kroells said he would support that and thought it was a great idea.

Kaltsas said the City recently adopted an amendment to the ordinance which established a process for the review and consideration of accessory structures that exceed the requisite height limitations established in the zoning ordinance. The amended ordinance allows the City Council to appoint a review committee that would review and apply the newly adopted ordinance provisions. An accessory structure may exceed the height of the principle structure if the accessory structure meets all applicable criteria of the Section and the following conditions are met:

- (1) Building plans containing any proposed accessory structure with a height exceeding that of the principle structure must be submitted to the City in advance of work to confirm compliance with this Section.
- (2) The City Council may establish an Accessory Building Height Review Committee to review building plans submitted for any proposed accessory structure with a height exceeding that of the principle structure to ensure compliance with the following:
 - a. On properties that are 2.5 acres or less, the proposed accessory structure must be located to the rear of the principle structure.
 - b. The proposed accessory structure must be detached and separated by a minimum distance of 75 feet from the principle structure.
 - c. The proposed accessory structure must meet the principle structure setbacks from all property lines.

d. The applicant shall provide with the application, the written consent of 100% of the owners or occupants of privately or publicly owned real estate directly abutting the premises for which the permit is being requested (on forms provided by the City). Where a street separates the premises for which the permit is being requested from other neighboring property, no consent is required from the owners or occupants of property located on the opposite side of the street. Where an abutting property consists of a multiple dwelling, the applicant need only obtain the written consent of the owner or manager, or other person in charge of the building.

Staff would like Council direction relating to the formation of the committee and appointment of three committee members. It was initially anticipated that the City would appoint two City Council Members and one Planning Commission Member or one City Council Member and two Planning Commission Members to form a three Person Committee.

Staff would like Council to provide direction relating to the appointment of the Accessory Building Height Review Committee. In addition to the appointment of the committee, Council will need to amend the Fee Schedule to include an Accessory Building Height Review Committee Application fee. Staff is recommending that the City consider adopting a \$100 application fee. This fee would provide approximately ¹/₄ hour of administrative review time and ³/₄ hour of planning/building review time.

The following fees are proposed to be added to the City's 2020 Fee Schedule:

1. Accessory Building Height Review Committee Application: \$100

Johnson asked how many of these types of requests have happened within the last five years. Kaltsas said there has been about $\frac{1}{2}$ dozen. There have been 3 variances that have come through in the last 8 years but many more have had to modify their building to what they did not really want in order to be able to build without a variance. There would be a \$100 fee to make the application. Grotting said he thought it was a great idea.

Discussion:

An agricultural preserve application has been received from William McMullen, for the property at 2750 County Line Road. The location of the property is shown on the attached map which is in the area guided and zoned agricultural under the City's zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan.

The property contains 69.91 acres. The parcel is eligible under Subdivision 1 of MN Statutes Chapter 473H.03 '*long-term agricultural land comprising 40 or more acres shall be eligible for designation as an agricultural preserve'*.

RESOLUTION ADOPTING MAP OF LAND ELIGIBLE FOR DESIGNATION AS AGRICULTURAL PRESERVES

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes, section 473H.04 authorizes the city of Independence (the "City") to designate by resolution and a map the land within the community is eligible for designation as agricultural preserves; and

WHEREAS, the City has received an application from William McMullen (the "Applicants") requesting that the city designate their land as eligible as agricultural preserves; and

WHEREAS, the City has determined it is in the best interest of the community to designate the Applicant's land as eligible as agricultural preserves and intends also to rezone said land from agriculture to agricultural preservation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the city council of the City of Independence, as follows:

- 1. The land identified on the map attached hereto as Exhibit A is hereby declared to be eligible for designation as agricultural preserves.
- 2. City staff is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a copy of this resolution, with the attached map, to the Metropolitan Council, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, section 473H.04, subd. 3.
- 3. City staff and consultants are hereby authorized and directed to take any and all additional actions necessary or convenient to accomplish the purpose of this resolution.



- TRAFFIC-- Includes violations of the road and driving laws.
- PART III-- Lost and Found: Includes lost and found persons, animals, and property, and stalled and abandoned vehicles.
- PART IV-- Casualties: Includes all motor vehicle accidents, boating, and snowmobile; public home occupational accidents, fires, suicides, sudden deaths, burning permits, and burning violations.
- PART V-- Miscellaneous Public: Includes open doors, gun permit applications, suspicious activities, animal complaints, motorist assists, alarm calls, parking complaints, house checks, driving complaints, civil matters, family disputes, department assists.

The balance of the report shows the total number of incidents handled, miles driven and how the Public Safety Department received calls. If anyone should desire more detailed statistical data, please contact my office.



City of Independence Resolution Approving 2020 Street Overlay Plans and Ordering advertisement of Bids

Discussion:

The City has determined that certain streets in the City are in need of reconstruction, repair and improvements. The City based its findings on the long-range street improvement plans which assess all streets in the City based on their age, condition, number of users and current condition. The City's engineer has prepared detailed plans and specifications for the 2020 Street Overlay Project. The overlay project will provide for an approximately one and half inch bituminous overlay on top of the existing roads included in the project. The project will also include the installation of a gravel shoulder, specific crack repair and the installation of a bituminous apron at certain road intersections. Approximately 6 miles of existing bituminous roads will be included in the project and are identified below:

- Stephanie Way
- Brei Kessel Road
- Merz Way
- Waldemar Way
- Providence Place
- Providence Court, Warren Way
- Providence Curve
- Providence Path
- Turner Road
- Polo Club Road
- Copeland Road
- Lindgren Lane
- Independence Road
- Budd Street
- Fieldstone Place
- Stone Court
- Hillstrom Road
- Drake Court
- Drake Drive
- Painter Creek Green
- Timber Island Trail

The City has prepared a 5-year street plan which corresponds with the bituminous overlay of the aforementioned streets.

In addition to the street reconstruction plan, the City is in the process of reviewing conditions and preparing plans and specifications for an update to the City Hall/West Hennepin Public Safety Building. The update would include the replacement of a portion of the HVAC equipment used to heat and cool the building, the replacement of the existing carpet/flooring throughout the building, replacement/repair of wall coverings, updating and making restrooms ADA compliant, updating the community room and City Council chambers, refinishing/painting portions of the building exterior and the addition of a new multi-purpose accessory building for WHPS and PW. The City has prepared the requisite five-year capital improvement plan identifying the proposed building improvements.

The City is required to hold a public hearing relating to the five-year capital improvement plan and street reconstruction plan and preliminarily approving the issuance of bonds required to carry out the plans. The City would need to give preliminary approval to the issuance of the Capital Improvement Bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$2,500,000. The City would also need to authorize the issuance and sale of general obligation street reconstruction bonds in a maximum principal amount of \$1,400,000.

Council Recommendation:

The City Council finds that the Street Reconstruction Plan will improve the City's system of public roads, which serves the interests of the City as a whole and approves the Plan in the form presented. In addition, the Council finds that the capital improvements identified in the Capital Improvement Plan serves the interest of the City as a whole and approves the Plan in the form presented. The Council authorizes staff to do all other things and take all other actions as may be necessary or appropriate to carry out both Plans in accordance with City Council is asked to consider approval of **RESOLUTION NO. 20-0317-02 and RESOLUTION NO. 20-0317-03**.

ADOPTING A FIVE-YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN AND PROVIDING PRELIMINARY APPROVAL FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS THEREUNDER

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Independence, Hennepin County, Minnesota (the "City"), as follows:

Section 1. <u>Background</u>.

1.01. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.521, as amended (the "Act"), cities are authorized to adopt a capital improvement plan and carry out programs for the financing of capital improvements. Pursuant to the Act, the City may issue general obligation bonds to finance the costs of capital improvements described in the capital improvement plan.

1.02. Before the approval of the capital improvement plan and the issuance of any bonds under the Act, the City is required to hold a public hearing on the capital improvement plan and the issuance of bonds thereunder.

1.03 The City has caused to be prepared the 2020 through 2024 Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan for the City of Independence, Minnesota (the "Plan").

1.04. On the date hereof, the Council conducted a duly noticed public hearing regarding adoption of the Plan pursuant to the requirements of the Act and the issuance of general obligation bonds in one or more series thereunder in order to finance a portion of the capital improvements identified in the Plan including the renovation, expanding, improvement and equipping of the City's existing City Hall, public safety and public works facilities.

1.05. The City has determined that it is in the best interests of the City to authorize the issuance and sale of general obligation capital improvement plan bonds in one or more series pursuant to the Act in a maximum principal amount of \$2,500,000 (the "Bonds").

1.06. In considering the Plan, the Council has considered for each project and for the overall Capital Improvement Plan:

- 1. the condition of the City's existing infrastructure, including the projected need for repair and replacement;
- 2. the likely demand for the improvement;
- 3. the estimated cost of the improvement;
- 4. the available public resources;
- 5. the level of overlapping debt in the City;
- 6. the relative benefits and costs of alternative uses of the funds;

- 7. operating costs of the proposed improvements; and
- 8. alternatives for providing services more efficiently through shared facilities with other local government units.

Section 2. Plan Approved; Bonds Authorized.

2.01 The Council finds that the Plan will provide for certain capital improvements, which serves the interest of the City as a whole. The Plan is hereby approved.

2.02 City staff are hereby authorized to do all other things and take all other actions as may be necessary or appropriate to carry out the Plan in accordance with any applicable laws and regulations, subject to the contingency in Section 2.03 below.

2.03 The City gives preliminary approval to the issuance of the Bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$2,500,000, provided that if a petition requesting a vote on issuance of the Bonds, signed by voters equal to five percent (5%) of the votes cast in the last general election, is filed with City Administrator by April 16, 2020, the City may issue the Bonds only after obtaining approval of a majority of voters voting on the question at an election. The authorization to issue the Bonds is subject to expiration of the 30-day period without the City's receipt of a qualified petition under the Act, or if a qualified petition is filed, upon the approving vote of a majority of the voters voting on the question of the Bonds.

RESOLUTION APPROVING THE ADOPTION OF A STREET RECONSTRUCTION PLAN AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET RECONSTRUCTION BONDS

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Independence, Hennepin County, Minnesota (the "City"), as follows:

Section 1. <u>Background</u>.

1.01. The City is authorized under Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.58, subdivision 3b, as amended (the "Act") to prepare a plan for street reconstruction in the City over the next five (5) years that will be financed under the Act, including a description of the proposed work and estimated costs. Pursuant to the Act, the City may issue general obligation bonds to finance the cost of street reconstruction activities described in the plan.

1.02. Before the approval of the street reconstruction plan and the issuance of any bonds under the Act, the City is required to hold a public hearing on the plan and the issuance of bonds thereunder.

1.03. Pursuant to the Act, the City, in consultation with its City engineer, has caused preparation of a street reconstruction plan for years 2020 through 2024 (the "Plan"), describing certain street reconstruction and overlay activities and the estimated costs of the Plan over the five-year period covered by the Plan. The reconstruction activities described in the Plan include, but are not limited to, bituminous overlay along with crack repair, restriping and shoulder work on roads within the City including Stephanie Way, Brei Kessel Road, Merz Way, Waldemar Way, Providence Place, Providence Court, Warren Way, Providence Curve, Providence Path, Turner Road, Polo Club Road, Copeland Road, Lindgren Lane, Independence Road, Budd Street, Fieldstone Place, Stone Court, Hillstrom Road, Drake Court, Drake Drive, Painter Creek Green and Timber Island Trail, as described in more detail in the Plan (collectively, the "Project").

1.05. The City has determined that it is in the best interests of the City to authorize the issuance and sale of general obligation street reconstruction bonds pursuant to the Act in a maximum principal amount of \$1,400,000 (the "Bonds"). The purpose of the Bonds is to finance the costs of the Project as described in the Plan.

1.06. On the date hereof, the City Council held a public hearing on the Plan and the issuance of the Bonds, after publication in the City's official newspaper of a notice of public hearing at least 10 days but no more than 28 days before the date of the public hearing.

Section 2. <u>Plan Approved; Bonds Authorized</u>.

2.01. The City Council finds that the Plan will improve the City's system of public roads, which serves the interests of the City as a whole, and approves the Plan in the form presented at the public hearing and on file at City Hall.

2.02. The City Council authorizes the issuance of the Bonds in accordance with the Plan. City staff and consultants are authorized to take all actions necessary to negotiate the sale of the Bonds, subject to the contingency described in Section 2.03 hereof.

2.03. If a petition requesting a vote on the issuance of the Bonds, signed by voters equal to five percent of the votes cast in the last municipal general election, is filed with the City Administrator within 30 days after the date of the public hearing, the City may issue the Bonds only after obtaining approval of a majority of voters voting on the question at an election. The authorization to issue the Bonds is subject to expiration of the 30-day period without the City's receipt of a qualified petition under the Act, or if a qualified petition is filed, upon the approving vote of a majority of the voters voting on the question of the Bonds.

2.04. City staff are authorized and directed to take all other actions necessary to carry out the intent of this resolution.

FIVE-YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

2020 THROUGH 2024

I. INTRODUCTION

In 2003, the Minnesota State Legislature adopted Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.521, as amended (the "Act") that generally exempts city and town general obligation bonds issued under a capital improvement plan from the referendum requirements usually required for city halls, public works, public safety facilities and libraries.

II. PURPOSE

Under the Act, a capital improvement is a major expenditure of City funds for the acquisition or betterment to public lands, buildings, or other improvements used as a city hall, town hall, library, public safety, or public works facility, which has a useful life of five years or more. Under the Act, capital improvements do not include light rail transit or related activities, parks, road/bridges, administrative buildings other than a city hall or town hall, or land for those facilities. A Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP" or "Plan") is a document designed to anticipate capital improvement expenditures and schedule them over a five-year period so that they may be purchased in the most efficient and cost-effective method possible. A CIP allows the matching of expenditures with anticipated income. As potential expenditures are reviewed, the City considers the benefits, costs, alternatives and impact on operating expenditures.

Before issuing bonds under a CIP, the City must hold a public hearing on the CIP and the proposed bonds, and must then approve the CIP and authorize the issuance of the bonds by at least a 3/5 majority.

If a petition signed by voters equal to at least 5% of the votes cast in the City at the last general City election requesting a vote on the issuance of bonds is received by the clerk within 30 days after the public hearing, then the bonds may not be issued unless approved by a majority of voters voting on the question at an election.

The Act established certain criteria that must be considered for each project to be undertaken pursuant to a CIP. These criteria are:

- 1. Condition of the City's existing infrastructure and projected need for repair or replacement
- 2. Likely demand for the improvement
- 3. Estimated cost of the improvement
- 4. Availability of public resources

- 5. Level of overlapping debt
- 6. Cost/benefits of alternative uses of funds
- 7. Operating costs of the proposed improvements
- 8. Alternatives for providing services most efficiently through shared facilities with other municipalities or local governments

III. PLAN SUMMARY

This Plan is intended to describe and analyze the need for the proposed capital improvement projects described herein in accordance with the Act. The City may modify this Plan from year to year as authorized by the Act.

Following is a summary of estimated expenditures proposed capital improvement projects in the City:

2020 Expenditures

The City intends to renovate, expand, improve and equip the City's existing City Hall, public safety and public works facilities (the "Project"). The estimated cost for this Project is \$2,500,000. The Project is to be financed through bond proceeds.

2021 Expenditures

None anticipated at this time.

2022 Expenditures

None anticipated at this time.

2023 Expenditures

None anticipated at this time.

2024 Expenditures

None anticipated at this time.

Analysis

The City has analyzed the eight points required by the Act for the Project on an individual basis and as a whole. The findings are as follows:

1. Conditions of City Infrastructure, Including the Projected Need for Repair or Replacement and Need for the Project

Staff has been working with an architect to analyze existing City facilities. The existing City Hall, public safety and public works facilities are outdated and too small to meet existing needs. Basic features at City Hall including carpet, HVAC, security systems, windows,

technology and other features have exceeded their useful life and require repair or replacement.

2. Likely Demand for the Project

The Project will modernize the City Hall, public safety and public works facilities to meet the needs of the growing community. The improvements to the City Hall will allow the City to provide additional room for meetings and gatherings. The improvements to the public safety facility and public works facility will enhance the public safety department's ability to deploy vehicles in a safe, efficient, and timely manner with the addition of additional garage spaces and parking.

3. Estimated Cost of the Project

The estimated cost, including architectural/engineering, contingency, legal and bonding, of the 2020 Project (the only Project for which bond authorization is requested) is \$2,500,000.

4. Available Public Resources

The City does not have sufficient cash reserves on hand to finance construction of the Project without issuing bonds.

5. Level of Overlapping Debt in the City

As of December 31, 2019, the level of overlapping debt in the City is provided in the table below:

⁽¹⁾ Tax Capacity Value is after tax increment deduction and fiscal disparity adjustments. The values for Metropolitan Council and Metro Transit are for 2018/2019; the 2019/2020 values are not yet available.

⁽³⁾ Metropolitan Council has \$1,200,000 of general obligation debt outstanding as of December 31, 2019. This debt is payable from ad valorem taxes levied on all taxable property within the Metropolitan Taxing District. This amount excludes \$1,289,704,035 of general obligation debt payable from wastewater and sewer revenues, and lease agreements.

6. Relative Benefits and Costs of Alternative Uses of the Funds

The proposed Project could potentially be financed through the issuance of lease-revenue bonds. However, both costs of issuance and overall debt service payments would be higher, since lease-revenue bonds are not general obligation debt and are therefore not as attractive to potential purchasers. The issuance of general obligation capital improvement plan bonds represents the most cost-efficient way to finance the proposed Project.

7. Operating Costs of the Proposed Project

Operating costs are expected to be stable with the proposed improvements. The Project will expand current facilities which may increase costs, but the proposed improvements and maintenance upgrades may also improve energy efficiency at City Hall. In addition, repair and maintenance costs are anticipated to decrease due to improvements and repairs.

8. Alternatives for Providing Services Most Efficiently Through Shared Facilities with Other Municipalities or Local Government Units

The current public safety facility already provides law enforcement services to the City as well as the neighboring City of Maple Plain, and will continue to provide shared law enforcement services.

Due to the nature of the City Hall facility and the services provided therein, there are no opportunities to share the facility with neighboring governmental jurisdictions.

IV. FINANCING THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The total amount of requested expenditures under this CIP is expected not to exceed \$2,500,000. These expenditures are to be funded by the sale of the City's general obligation capital improvement plan bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$2,500,000 for the Project listed under the 2020 Expenditures.

Two statutory limitations apply to financing projects under a CIP. Under Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 475, as amended, with few exceptions, a municipality cannot incur debt in excess of 3% of the assessor's estimated market value of taxable property ("TMV") for the municipality. In the case of a municipality with a population of 2,500 or less, bonds issued under the Act are not subject to the net debt limits. The City's 2010 Census population was 3,504. Therefore, the proposed Bonds to be issued in the years 2020 through 2024 would be subject to the debt limit.

In addition, the total amount that can be used for principal and interest in any one year for CIP debt issued under the Act cannot exceed 0.16% of the estimated market value for the City. The maximum annual principal and interest for the City is \$1,195,809.18 (\$747,380,736 x .0016).

Under this CIP, the City may issue up to \$2,500,000 in general obligation capital improvement plan bonds in the years 2020 through 2024 to finance the Project. If the City were to issue general obligation capital improvement bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$2,500,000 for the 2020 Project, the bond issue would be repaid over a period not to exceed thirty (30) years pursuant to the Act. For preliminary planning purposes, the

maximum annual principal and interest payments would be estimated not to exceed \$299,375 over 21 years at an average rate of 2.2976% per annum (this amount takes into account the 105% debt service coverage requirement required by law). The expected debt service payments for the proposed bonds to be issued in 2020, along with the final \$109,200 payment due on December 1, 2020 on the City's General Obligation Capital Improvement Plan Bonds, Series 2006A, is within the statutory limits.

The City may delay the Project and the issuance of general obligation capital improvement bonds until subsequent years of this Plan and postpone the issuance of any general obligations, or issue any general obligation bonds in more than one series, so long as the total general obligation bonds so issued do not exceed the maximum amount authorized in this Plan.

Annual Review of the Capital Improvement Plan

The City Council, using the process outlined in this CIP, may review this CIP annually, taking into account proposed expenditures, making priority decisions and seeking funding for those expenditures it deems necessary for the City. If deemed appropriate, the City Council will prepare an update to this CIP.

City of Independence, Minnesota Street Reconstruction Plan 2020 through 2024

City of Independence, MN Street Reconstruction Plan 2020 through 2024

Statutory Authority and Requirements

Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.58, subdivision 3b, as amended (the "Act"), authorizes a Minnesota city to adopt a Street Reconstruction Plan (a "Plan") and to issue general obligation bonds to finance costs associated therewith. The Plan must cover a five-year period and set forth the street reconstruction or overlay projects to be financed, the estimated costs, and any planned reconstruction or overlay of other streets in the municipality. The Plan must be approved by a two-thirds majority of members of the City Council present at the meeting after a duly noticed public hearing.

Street reconstruction and bituminous overlays includes utility replacement and relocation and other activities incidental to the street reconstruction, turn lanes and other improvements having a substantial public safety function, realignments, other modifications to intersect with state and county roads, and the local share of state and county road projects.

Except in the case of turn lanes, safety improvements, realignments, intersection modifications, and the local share of state and county road projects, street reconstruction does not include the portion of the project cost allocable to widening a street or adding curbs and gutters where none previously existed.

A city may issue general obligation bonds for improvements included in an approved Plan if the following conditions are satisfied:

- 1. The Plan has been approved following a public hearing for which notice has been published in the City's official newspaper at least 10 days, but not more than 28 days prior to the hearing.
- 2. The issuance of general obligation bonds to finance the costs the Plan or any portion thereof has been approved following the public hearing described above.
- 3. The Plan and the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance the Plan or any portion thereof must be approved by a vote of a two-thirds majority of the members of the governing body present at the meeting following the public hearing.
- 4. The approved obligations are subject to referendum voter approval only if a petition requesting a vote and signed by 5% of the votes cast in the last municipal general election is filed with the City Clerk within 30 days of the public hearing.

This Plan provides for the issuance of general obligation street reconstruction bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$1,400,000 (the "Bonds") for street reconstruction and overlay projects contemplated in the years 2020 through 2024 as described below.

Net Debt Limits

Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.53, subdivision 1, as amended, states that no municipality, except a school district or a city of the first class, shall incur or be subject to a net debt in excess of three percent of the market value of taxable property in the municipality. Bonds issued under the authority granted in this Plan are subject to the net debt limit restriction described above. The City currently has the following net debt capacity:

Available Debt Capacity

The City proposes to issue the Bonds pursuant to this Plan in 2020. The proposed bond issuance is within the City's net debt limit.

Proposed Street Reconstruction and Overlay Projects & Cost Estimates

The City has identified streets that are in various stages of disrepair. To mitigate this issue, the City will undertake street reconstruction projects in 2020. The City anticipates that the reconstruction of street in the City may include crack repair, restriping and shoulder work in association with the bituminous overlay in strategic locations. Streets included in the project proposed for 2020 include the following as evidenced by the map attached hereto as Exhibit A:

Stephanie Way - entire length

Brei Kessel Road – entire length

Merz Way - entire length

Waldemar Way – entire length

Providence Place – entire length

Providence Court – entire length

Warren Way - entire length

Providence Curve – entire length

Providence Path – entire length

Turner Road - from CSAH 90 West to Polo Club Road

Polo Club Road – entire length

Copeland Road – from CSAH 6 North for a distance of 1,300 feet

Lindgren Lane – entire length

Independence Road - entire length

Budd Street - from Pagenkopf Road North to end

Fieldstone Place – entire length

Stone Court – entire length

Hillstrom Road – entire length

Drake Court – entire length

Drake Drive - entire length

Painter Creek Green - entire length

Timber Island Trail – entire length



The City does not currently anticipate other street reconstruction or overlay projects to be financed with the proceeds of general obligation bonds in the years 2021 through 2024. The City may delay reconstruction and overlay of certain portions of the above described projects until subsequent years of this Plan and postpone the issuance of the Bonds, or issue the Bonds in more than one series, so long as the Bonds so issued do not exceed the maximum amount authorized in this Plan. If the City determines to issue additional bonds for future reconstruction costs not described in this Plan, the City will revise this plan to identify the amount of such bonds after a public hearing in accordance with the Act
