2026 BUDGET INFORMATION

2026 Budget Highlights

For the ninth consecutive year, the City Council has adopted a preliminary budget that reduces or holds flat the municipal tax rate, reaffirming our commitment to efficient, effective, and value-driven local government. This approach ensures that the City's share of property taxes remains stable year over year—assuming consistent market valuations as determined by the Hennepin County Assessor's Office.

Did you know? The City's portion of property taxes accounts for only about one-third of your total property tax bill. The remaining amount is split between Hennepin County and your school district.

Since 2017, Independence has consistently maintained or lowered its local tax rate while continuing to deliver high-quality services to residents. This fiscal responsibility extends to our long-range capital planning for streets, utilities, equipment, and buildings. All capital expenditures are fully funded with cash—no debt issuance—ensuring financial stability for years to come.


What's new for 2026?

We've increased funding and updated our long-range street improvement plan, focusing on upgrading all gravel roads with:

- 3–6 inches of new gravel
- Enhanced drainage systems
- Culvert replacements

Other critical improvements to ensure safer, more durable roads.

MAYORS MESSAGE

Fall Forward – If there was a way to describe the Fall quarter in our beautiful City it might be "A season of successful collaborations"

Maple Plain, Independence and the West Suburban Fire District have worked together to consolidate the Maple Plain Fire Department into the West Suburban Fire District (formerly

known as Loretto and Hamel FD's) to better serve both our communities and the Volunteer Firefighters we rely upon. This process should culminate in a combined entity as of January 1, 2026.

Delano, Maple Plain and Independence, seeing little progress on the next stage of safety improvements to the Highway 12 corridor have joined forces to contract for professional lobbying/grant application assistance to further the cause. The alliance has already yielded an added stop on the Senate Capital Investment Committee bonding tour – Hopefully we can gain some funding visibility in 2026.

After more than a year of discussions, the Met Council has agreed to assume responsibility for replacement / upsizing of a section of the Joint Powers sewer line that serves the cities of Independence, Medina, Loretto, and Greenfield. This collaboration should save the 4 communities including ours roughly \$600,000. Kudos to our Administrator Mark Kaltsas!

The high-water problems continue to plague the lake Independence residents and users. This summer, with the coordination primarily by Chris Dahlberg and the Lake Independence Citizens Association, the outlet channel was cleared of the vegetative blockages with a cost share spread between LICA, Three Rivers Park District, Pioneer Sarah Creek


Watershed, Medina, and Independence. Hopefully this will alleviate the high-water levels experienced during the past 2 summers.

A quiet crossing is being sought for the CP Rail crossing at Townline Road just west of Loretto. There is some County funding for these projects but due to the complexity and concern for safety, these proposals can take many years. The project was proposed at the request of Loretto and is compliment to the quiet crossing at CR19. It includes both the Cities of Independence and Medina due to the crossing location. If successful an installation project could commence in early 2028.

Mark your calendars for these seasonal events including: WHPS Reserves View Santa on Saturday December 6th in Maple Plain and Independence, CP Rail Holiday Train in Loretto on December 15th from 4:30 – 5:00pm, bring something to contribute to the Food shelf at both of those events. Old Fashioned Christmas in Delano on Saturday December 6 from 10am-4pm. Toys for Tots drop off site will again be at Independence City Hall.



PIONEER CREEK CHANNEL CLEANOUT BRINGS NEW TECHNOLOGY TO LAKE INDEPENDENCE

If you were traveling along Pagenkonf

If you were traveling along Pagenkopf Road or Independence Road in mid-October and thought you saw a tank floating on Pioneer Creek — you weren't imagining things!

The Lake Independence Citizens Association (LICA), in partnership with the Cities of Independence and Medina, the Three Rivers Park District, and the Pioneer Sarah Creek Watershed Management Commission, recently completed a project to clear out cattail vegetation that had built up in the lake's outlet channel over the past several years. This vegetation — both floating and rooted — was impeding water flow. Because the channel serves as the lake's only outlet, the blockage contributed to the sustained high water levels experienced in recent years.

Over the past 15 years, two previous cleanout projects were completed in the dead of winter, when thick ice allowed heavy equipment to access the area. Excavators drove out over the frozen channel and dug through the ice to remove the dense cattail roots and sediment that had accumulated during warmer months. With no direct lake access and no suitable launch site, working on the ice was once the only feasible option.

Recent advances in equipment technology, however, have opened new possibilities. In the fall of 2024, LICA partnered with Aquatic Weed Harvesting of Henning, Minnesota, to plan a channel cleanout using an innovative amphibious machine called the Truxor. The Truxor can operate on land, water, or wet terrain in between — eliminating the need for a traditional launch site. It's equipped with two key attachments: a mower that cuts cattails at the channel floor, and a bucket that removes floating debris clogging the surface.



To make the project possible, LICA obtained the necessary permits from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and worked with nearby homeowners for access to the channel. Special thanks go to the Knox and Geyen families for granting access from their properties along Pagenkopf Road. A special shout-out also goes to Joe Baker, Independence's commissioner on the Pioneer Sarah Creek Watershed Management Commission, for cutting through buckthorn to help open the access path!

Once the Truxor was in the water, Aquatic Weed Harvesting used it to traverse the 3,500-foot channel, clearing cattails from the bottom and reopening a path from Pagenkopf Road all the way to Independence Road. After mowing the vegetation, the crew switched attachments to remove floating root mats and debris, restoring the channel to its designated 15-foot width, as required by the DNR.

The removed cattails and root material were floated or carried by machine to the access point, where they were brought to shore and loaded by skid loader into dump trailers. The debris was then hauled to the City of Medina's compost facility, where it will decompose into nutrient-rich organic material.

As part of its ongoing water quality improvement efforts, LICA has also developed an annual maintenance plan to minimize cattail regrowth and remove floating bogs as needed to keep the channel clear.

Be Aware While Shopping

Online Shopping? Stay Cyber-Smart

Package Theft Prevention

- Use delivery tracking and signature requirements when possible.
- Have packages sent to a work address, locker, or ask a trusted neighbor to collect them.
- Install security cameras or a video doorbell if feasible.



WHERE TO PLACE YOUR GARBAGE CANS DURING WINTER

Heavy snow accumulation, icy roads and/or poor visibility during snow removal can make it difficult for snowplows to avoid garbage cans placed alongside the road. PLEASE do not place garbage cans in the roadway. We realize this cleared area is an inviting location to place garbage cans, but it creates a hazard as they can be hit by vehicles or by snowplows.

Most garbage trucks are equipped with a hydraulic arm that grasps garbage cans. It is recommended that garbage cans be placed at least 3 to 5 feet off the edge of pavement (but not on top of snow piles), into your driveway, so they are out of the way of the snowplow while the snowplow is clearing the road. Please keep in mind, the Highway Department is NOT responsible for damaged garbage cans.
