2040 Comprehensive Plan Update

Thank you to all who attended the first few Comp Plan meetings for the City of Independence! We appreciate the huge response to our Community Survey- 421 of you responded!

If you'd like details of the survey results, please visit the web-site and click on the link. Our web-site also has the Planning Commission meeting minutes from the July 18th and August 15th meetings.

At the August 15th meeting, residents present broke into four groups. Each group drew on one map how they perceived the future of Independence to look. If you would like to participate the next meeting will be held October 17 at 7:30 pm at Independence City Hall. Please join us!



Fall again brings to mind another election cycle locally. November 7th is election day for our City and some of the School Districts. It is very important to vote even though there may not be competitive races this fall.

We are working on our budget for 2018 for the City with all its departments and contracts. Probably before you get this newsletter the council will have already voted on an estimated levy for next year's taxes. This budget will continued to be reviewed until our final December 2017 council meeting at which time the council can only vote to reaffirm the original budget or reduce it.

Continuing through this fall and into next year we will be having meetings regarding the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan for 2040. The visioning sessions, up to the present time, have surfaced only minor changes to the present plan. By the fall of 2018 we need to complete our plan and present it to the Metropolitan Council for approval.

As you have noticed we had road resurfacing projects completed within the City. The County Road 92 north of County Road 11 and County Road 90 between U.S. Highway 12 and County Road 6 had additional width added to the pavement surface while County Road 110 south of County Road 6 was just resurfaced. What a nice job the county did. The roads are so smooth now you have to be careful of your speed.

We've commented before about the money the Legislature and MNDOT designated for U.S. Highway 12 improvements. Those improvements won't happen immediately. There will be highway designers and consultants working on the projects, then public hearings/open houses and finally approval by the City, County and MDOT before the projects can be let out for bid. There may have to be some "Right Of Way" purchases too.

Coming soon all of our Fire Departments will be having their 'Open Houses' Try to stop in if your available. We do appreciate all the members of our local departments; Delano, Loretto and Maple Plain for their dedication to serve the community as first responders and giving of their time for continuous training. "Thank You"! If you can't stop by, why not send a note of Thanks!

West Hennepin Public Safety News: WHPS has joined a pilot program for a weapon mounted camera system developed by Viridian Weapon Technologies of Maple Plain. The unique technology attaches directly to an officers weapon and activates automatically once the weapon is drawn from the holster.

Chief Kroells stated, "The officer does not have to push a button to turn on the camera or remember to turn it on during a high stress encounter. "If you take your gun out of your holster the camera turns on, with audio", said Chief Kroells.

No other product captures vid-

eo from the direction an officer is pointing his weapon or what the officer is confronted with during a critical time when use of force is deployed.

West Hennepin is currently developing written policies on the use of cameras and the storage of the data. Chief Kroells stated, "The video data is password protected and will only be handled by a supervisor in all use of force events.



Kroells stated, "The camera allows for human error or

mistakes to not occur, we are all human and in this particular case anytime you pull your weapon out it could be a deadly force situation so we'd like to capture that on video."



The Ultimate Sacrifice

As law enforcement professionals you never know how each day or each call will turn out. Police Officers are the peace keepers of our communities and are tasked with handling many difficult incidents each and every day. "Police Officers are human and we want what everyone else wants. To safely go home and enjoy our families", said Chief Kroells.

Wayzata Police Officer William Mathews was tragically killed on Highway 12 when he was struck by a vehicle while trying to remove a piece of metal from the roadway. Officer Mathews gave the ultimate sacrifice and was killed in the line of duty on Friday September 8, 2017.

Don't Let Leaves Litter Lakes and Cause Stormwater Pollution!

Leaves fall and decompose but if there is no soil to land on they end up washing down streets and into storm drains. From there they go directly into lakes and rivers where the nutrients will feed unwanted algae growth next summer. In addition to a major "ick" factor, the algae dies and decomposes at the bottom of the lake where it uses up oxygen that fish and native plants need.

In the Mississipi River-Twin Cities watershed 87 of 180 lakes studied didn't meet water quality standards because of excess nutrients – that is about half the lakes! Leaves are a major source of the problem. Depending on the lake, leaves might account for 60% of the excess nutrients in these lakes.

One of the best ways to use leaves is to compost them in your backyard. Whole or shredded leaves may also be used as mulch for your garden. Mulch benefits the soil and reduces weeds. It is illegal to add leaves to your regular trash and burning them releases large amounts of air pollution!

The City of Delano has a punch card available for purchase for residents outside of the city limits. The card is \$50.00 for five punches and certain conditions apply. Contact the City of Delano for more information.

Did you know?

Only 1/3 of parents talk to their kids each year about Halloween safety.

Twice as many kids are killed as pedestrians by cars on Halloween than on any other day of the year.

Suspicious fires and arson fires skyrocket around Halloween.

- Avoid costumes with long or billowing fabric-it can be a fire hazard.
- Use battery operated candles or glow sticks inside jack-o-lanterns.
- Teach children to stay away from open flames and to stop, drop and roll if their clothes catch fire.
- Keep decorations like hay and corn stalks away from any ignition source.



City Snowplow Policy

West Hennepin Public Safety, Public Works, and the Hennepin County Highway division would like to caution residents that it is unlawful to dump, plow or push snow from private driveways onto highway or city streets whether you are

plowing your driveway or you have hired someone to remove snow.

Snow dumped on highways or street right-of-ways can create a hazard not only for motorists, but also for snowplows. Even heavy snowplows have been ditched and damaged when hitting compacted and frozen snow. The person responsible for depositing snow on roadways may also be liable in a civil lawsuit if damages or injuries occur as a result of this action.

The violations are considered a misdemeanor, punishable by a maximum \$700 fine and/or 90 days in jail. Independence Public Works and WHPS will be enforcing these laws.

Public Works strives to clear snow and ice from City roads as soon as possible. Delays may occur in the event of extreme weather or equipment breakdowns. The safety of the Public and City employees is a top priority. The City has more than 56 miles of roads, and 60 cul-de-sacs that are maintained by the Public Works Department. The criteria for the decision to begin snow and/ or ice removal are as follows:

- \Rightarrow Snow accumulation of two inches or more warrants the plowing of asphalt roads, two to four inches warrants the plowing of both asphalt and gravel roads dependent on road conditions. Start time for removal is normally 2:00 a.m. when practical.
- \Rightarrow High volume major collector roads and roads with steep hills and curves receive first priority.
- \Rightarrow Safety of the plow operators and the public are important. Snowplowing may be terminated after 12-14 hours to allow personnel to rest. High winds creating white out conditions may also suspend plowing until weather improves.
- \Rightarrow The City will assume no responsibility for damage to underground lawn sprinkling systems, exterior lighting systems, and similar landscaping installed in the public right-of-way.

Garbage Can Driveway Location! Please place garbage cans inside your driveway perimeter on pickup days. Garbage containers should never be placed on roadways.

Mailbox Reminder! Ensure your mail box posts are sturdy and set solidly in the ground. The City is not responsible for mailboxes damaged by snow being pushed of roads!
