GRAVEL ROAD PROJECT

Significant gravel roadway improvements will improve gravel roads throughout the city. A total of approximately 18 miles of gravel roadway will be upgraded as part of this Capital Improvement Plan project.

The enhancements to the gravel roads will include the following:

- Gravel Recapping (adding new gravel on top of existing road)
- Drain Tile Improvements
- Spot Soil Stabilization Corrections
- Stormwater Management Spot Repairs
- Stormwater Culvert Replacements

Ditch Grading Improvements

Due to significant rain events this summer, the project will now begin in the beginning of September and be substantially complete by the end of November. Please contact City Hall with any questions relating to the gravel road project.


First Phase: County Line Phase will start On September 8, 2025, and will end around September 29, 2025.

Next Phase: Are the Pioneer Phase starts September 29, 2025, ends around October 23, 2025.

Last Phase: Lake Sarah Phase starts October 26, 2025, end around November 20, 2025

- Leaves & Grass (\$13.00/cubic yard or \$3.00/kraft paper lawn bag)
- Brush (\$21.00/cubic yard)
- Logs (\$21.00/cubic yard)
- Stumps (\$40.00/cubic yard)
- Wood/Tree Service Chips (\$12.50/cubic yard)
- Sod and Soil (\$10.00/cubic yard)

Useful Measurement References

- 1 yard is approximately 6 full wheelbarrows of material
- A medium size pickup holds approximately 1.5 yards of material level with the side rails
- A full-size pickup with a regular box holds approximately 2 yards of material level with the side rails
- A full-size pickup with an extended box holds approximately 2.5 yards of material level with the side rails

Bruce's Fall Reminders SEPTIC

- Keep long grass on septic to help prevent from freezing.
- Keeping it pumped every 3-5 years allows it to be compliant and helps homeowners avoid costly repairs.

CHIMNEY FIRES

Chimney fires can be dangerous if the flue is not kept clean. Creosote can build up in chimney and cause fires. Burning Creosote logs doesn't work as well as brushing does for getting the creosote out of the chimneys.

IMPORTANT RESPONSIBILITIES FOR PROPERTY OWNERS

CULVERTS — Why should I be concerned about the ones near my property?

Fall is the time that the ends of culverts located on or near your property must be cleaned out. Doing so now allows for proper water flow when the spring thaws. Uncleared culverts potentially prevent drainage allowing water to flow as it should and avoids ponding up.

As the landowner, what are my responsibilities?

You are responsible for driveway culvert maintenance. Culvert maintenance involves keeping both the inlet and outlet of the pipe free of debris so that it works properly, including removing snow and ice during the winter months whenever possible. To further clarify who is responsible for what, this image shows which are the landowner's, adjacent landowner's, and Independence Public Works' responsibilities.



CLEANING MASONRY FIREPLACES AND FURNACES—A pro tip from Forbes Advisor says,"The best time to clean chimneys in your home is in the warmer months, between spring and late summer" when chimney cleaners are less busy. A clean chimney improves the energy efficiency of your home and may help you save on your energy bill).



NOTE: Sprinkler heads are not allowed in the right of way (ROW). During snow plowing season, if the City hits them, the City is not responsible for replacing them.





WHERE TO PLACE YOUR GARBAGE CANS DURING WINTER

Heavy snow accumulation, icy roads and/or poor visibility during snow removal can make it difficult for snowplows to avoid garbage cans placed alongside the road. PLEASE do not place garbage cans in the roadway. We realize this cleared area is an inviting location to place garbage cans, but it creates a hazard as they can be hit by vehicles or by snowplows.

Most garbage trucks are equipped with a hydraulic arm that grasps garbage cans. It is recommended that garbage cans be placed at least 3 to 5 feet off the edge of pavement (but not on top of snow piles), into your driveway, so they are out of the way of the snowplow while the snowplow is clearing the road. Please keep in mind, the Highway Department is NOT responsible for damaged garbage cans.




NO PARKING -FOLLOWING A 3-INCH SNOW FALL

On street parking is prohibited until a street has been plowed curb to curb.

SEASONAL PARKING

November 1 - April 14

Between the hours of 2 a.m. and 8 a.m. on street parking, of any vehicle, is prohibited.
