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MAYOR JOHNSON'S LETTER

Just recently, all property owners in the City should have received their 2018 Valuation statements from Hennepin County. Look them over carefully because this value is what your 2019 taxes is calculated from. As a base to work from, the value of most homes increased 2.5%. House lots remained pretty constant and agriculture land value decreased slightly. However, if you made major renovations or additions to your home, the previously listed change would be different.

If you question the valuation statement, the first thing you should do is talk to our City's Hennepin County Assessor, David Thomsen, or his staff at 612-388-5426. A call may be sufficient or it may be necessary to make an appointment to visit your property if they haven't been able to meet with you for a few years. If you are still not satisfied, you can present your case before the Council Board of Appeal on April 3rd at 6:00 p.m. Call the City staff to be placed on the agenda. You have the right to appeal to Hennepin County if you have done all the foregoing steps. *Cont. p.2*

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Since our local Senator David Osmek and Representative Jerry Hertaus were able to get some special funding for Highway 12 improvement projects at County Roads 92 and 90, Minnesota Department of Transportation and other agencies have been drawing designs. We thought we were fairly close to having a public "open house" to view some preliminary designs when just within the past month we were told that an Environment Assessment needed to be done first at the County Road 92 intersection. This could take up to two years. We are trying to convince all agencies involved, including Hennepin County Transportation that we must take a long term view on what is done at these intersections because of growth in our area and to the west.

Discussions, brainstorming, suggestions, or whatever you wish to call it are continuing on the 2040 Comprehensive Land Use Plan for the City of Independence and all other local units of government. A previously mailed questionnaire is a part of that planning. If you want to be a part of the team, check with city hall, but most of the meetings are held after the Council and Planning Commission meetings on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. Your input would be particularly appreciated when we hold "open houses" for the Comprehensive Plan.

This is an important election year again. All the State Offices beginning with the Governor, Lt. Governor, Secretary of State, etc... and our Senate District Representative are to be voted on. Our two United States Senators and Congressman are also up. The only person not up for election this year is our District 33 Senator, David Osmek of Mound who is midway through a four-year term. Most likely the Primary election in August will determine who some of the candidates will be. That is usually a low turnout, but could be an extremely important election.

With spring comes the hard work for many maple syrup collectors. Let's hope they have a good year. The last days of February and start of March was a teaser and most people were not yet ready. When we get warm days and then the temperature drops below freezing every night, is when syrup collection is at its best.

City Councilmembers' Re-election!

On Tuesday, January 2, 2018, Councilmembers' Brad Spencer and Lynn Betts were re-appointed at a swearing in at the City Council meeting. Brad is beginning his 3rd four year term as a City Councilmember. Prior to this he served 5-6 years on the Planning Commission where he currently is our liaison between Planning Commission and City Council. Lynn Betts was re-elected for her 5th term as a City Councilmember. She previously chaired the Parks Commission.

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As the Director of Public Safety for West Hennepin Public Safety Department (WHPS), it is my honor to submit the 2017 Annual Report. The report is available online as of April 17th at <u>www.westhennepin.com</u>

In this year's report, you will find information highlighting different areas of law enforcement, emergency management, community involvement, training, and our volunteer programs. This annual report reflects the commitment our staff continues to show towards our citizens and our community.

2017 is the first year I can recall West Hennepin Public Safety was fully staffed. Within the last five years, over half of our officers have retired, changed careers, or moved on to work at other metro police departments. In replacing those officers, a great deal of time was focused on hiring and training our new officers. I can say with great pride our current department is the most active,

hardworking, compassionate group of people I have every worked with. Your police officers are second to none and I am very proud of this department.

As part of our emergency preparedness function, all of our police officers attended a one day course on handling a regional response to a mass casualty event in the summer of 2017. After the training, additional medical equipment was purchased and we worked with our local fire departments on additional training. In the fall of 2017, all Maple Plain firefighters were also trained in this same course. I am very proud to report all West Hennepin police officers and Maple Plain firefighters are now trained and equipped to handle a mass casualty event.

West Hennepin will continue to find effective and efficient ways to provide proactive police services to our

citizens. Our interaction with the public and our citizens is paramount in our working toward the betterment of our communities.

I am happy to report West Hennepin Public Safety Department did not have a single fatality crash in 2017. People traveling on Highway 12 have a safer road to use, in part due to the proud work of the Highway 12 Safety Coalition. The Coalition also successfully lobbied our legislature for 11.3 million dollars for intersection safety improvements at County Road 92 and County Road 90, currently scheduled for construction in 2020-2021.

As you review this report, I hope that you feel the same pride I do in recognizing all of the great accomplishments our department has achieved in serving our communities in 2017. It is truly an honor and privilege to serve as the Director of Public Safety for the West Hennepin Public Safety Department. I hope that we have made a positive impact in your lives as we will continue working hard for you in 2018.

Minnesota Severe Weather Awareness Week is April 9-13, 2018

Are you ready for severe weather? Each year, HSEM in collaboration with the National Weather Service and 16 State and local agencies and organizations sponsors Severe Weather Awareness Week in Minnesota. The week is designed to refresh, remind and educate everyone about the seasonal threats from severe



weather and how to avoid them. It's also a great time to make and practice your emergency plan and build or refresh your emergency preparedness kit.

The most important events during Severe Weather Awareness Week are the two annual statewide tornado drills. **These drills are scheduled for Thursday, April 12 2018 at 1:45 p.m. and 6:45 p.m.**

Outdoor warning sirens and NOAA Weather Radios will sound in a simulated tornado warning. The first drill is intended for institutions

and businesses. The evening drill is intended for second shift workers and families.



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Please note these sewer tips!

DO NOT put products such as paper towels, wipes, condoms, sanitary napkins, feminine products, moist wipes in the toilet. **The only thing that should be flushed is toilet paper.**

<u>Garbage disposals</u> are not meant to handle solids such as fruit and vegetable rinds

and peels, corn kernels, eggshells and bones. These items cause blockage in the sewer lines. Also, do not dump cooking grease and oils down the drain. Flushing the grease with hot water does not work either, it actually causes stoppage further down the drain. To dispose of cooking grease, pour it into a heat-resistant container, and allow it to cool and set. That container may then disposed of in the regular garbage.

<u>State Law</u> limits city responsibility for sewer back-ups because the city does not have exclusive control of the city's sanitary sewer system. Damage can occur to homes and property for which the city will not be legally liable. As a result, a prudent homeowner may wish to discuss purchasing additional coverage with their homeowner's insurance carrier/ agent.

Many of you ask about where to bring brush and other compostable garbage. Independence does not have our own site, but The City of Delano has a compost site available to residents outside of their city limits by purchasing a Compost Site punch card.

You may stop inside Delano City Hall to pick up a punch card. The punch cards are \$50.00 per card. This will get you five punches per card. When you bring your compost material to the site, the attendant will look at your driver's license and punch your card. Loads 8'x6' will be one punch; larger loads will be two punches.

ACCEPTED Materials:

Air Conditioners: \$25. No gas air conditioners or refrigerators unless you pay \$200.

Appliances: \$20. Includes dehumidifiers, heat pumps, water heaters, microwaves, washers, dryers, refrigerators, etc.

Carpet: Small roll \$15. Large roll (greater than 5'x8') \$25.

Construction Material/Debris/Junk: \$20/cubic yard. Includes doors, lumber, fences, tile, sheetrock.

Mattresses, Box Springs, Upholstered Furniture: \$50 (vendor raised their cost)

Scrap Iron/Metal: No Charge. All plastic to be removed. Tanks/Barrels must be cut in half.

Tires: \$5/ car, \$10/ semi, \$20/ tractor. With or without rims.

Flourescent Tubes/Bulbs: DO NOT tape together. In original packaging or surrounded by cardboard. Must be dissambeled and ballasts disconnected from housing unit. Bulbs 4' and under .50, over 4' - \$1, ballasts - \$2 and light fixtures - \$10.

Propane tanks – under 3' - \$5, over 3' - \$10
