One nice part of all the snow this year is that the ground is not frozen in most places, and it should absorb the moisture when it starts melting. That should help relive the drought of last summer.

The State and Federal Legislators are now in session. I am not very pleased with how they are functioning. Many years in the past I have attended the National League of Cities Legislative Conference in Washington D. C. in March. This year I am not going but will attend some sessions virtually if that provision is provided.



Our new State Senator, Warren Limmer, and State Representative, Kristin Robbins, have taken the time to attend a Council meeting and are very open to any feedback we can give them.

Soon you as a homeowner will be receiving your new valuation statements from the County. Study them carefully. If you have questions, call our County Assessor before you forget about it. If you still question your value, plan to attend our City Council Board of Appeal at 6 p.m. on April 4th to appeal.



The City is a member of the Highway 55 Corridor Coalition which has been functioning for several years. We have supported and helped to secure funds, both Federal and State dollars, for several intersection projects in Hennepin and Wright Counties. The last couple of years our main thrust has been to rebuild State Highway 55 as a four-lane divided highway all the way from west of Hamel to County Road 19 just north of Loretto and east of our City Limits. This may be the year funding will

become available either via direct state funding or through the Corridors of Commerce special fund. If so, I think in 2024 we could see some construction.

In the near future we will be having our City Audit. April 4th at 6 pm is our City Council's Local Board of Appeal and Equalization meeting. May 6th from 9am – noon is our annual City-wide Spring Clean Up Day. Before we know it, people will be tapping the Maple trees for sap and summer is not far behind. Try to enjoy the rest of winter.

Board of Appeal and Equalization Council Meeting—6 pm on April 4th, 2023

If you are questioning the value of your property's recent County assessment, follow these steps:

- Call the County Assessor at #612-348-3046. You will need to enter your <u>PID</u>/Property ID Number & <u>#</u>. Your PID number can be found either on your statement— found online if you didn't receive it via mail.
 - ⇒ From <u>Hennepin County Property Information Search webpage</u>, enter your PID/ property ID number or Address, and select Search. Then select 2023 Proposed Property Tax (Truth in Taxation Statement). https://www.hennepin.us/residents/property/assessment (Their video is very informative.)
- 2. **Call City Hall by March 30th** at #763-479-0527 and ask to be added to the Local Board of Appeal & Equalization meeting's Agenda. Then the Council will address yours at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, April 4th, 2023.
- 3. If needed, appeal at the County Board of Appeal meeting (virtually). Both previous steps are required.

2023 Budget Information

For the past seven years, City Council has prepared its annual budget using a flat City tax rate of 40%. The result of maintaining a flat tax rate is that if no market value increase is realized for a particular property, there would be no tax increase for the City portion of a property's taxes. (A city's portion of property taxes is approximately 30% of the total taxes.) This year, properties in the City saw a significant increase in market valuations of nearly 20%. Council recognized this significant increase and has worked diligently to establish a 2023 tax levy that meaningfully <u>reduces</u> the City's tax rate to offset some or all of the market value increase impacts. The City Council has adopted a final tax levy based on a City tax rate of 33.12% (more than a 5% decrease year over year). This reduction will allow close to 50% of all properties in Independence to realize no increase or see a reduction in the total property tax bill.

The General Fund tax levy increased \$199,275 over prior year. Increases to the General Fund levy are a result of an increase in operational, equipment and material costs, utilities, wages, and insurance.


The City worked to increase police and staff wages commensurate with inflation.


Police protection costs increased \$165,223 or 12.57% over prior year. This increase is largely due to reduced revenue from forfeitures and grants (change in law) and increased insurance, wages, and operational costs.

Fire services increased \$33,525 or 8.86% over prior year.

The City continues to maintain its long range (10 plus year) capital planning for streets, equipment, and buildings. The City will continue to fully fund all capital plans so that acquisition of new equipment and maintenance of buildings and facilities is paid for with cash rather than with issuance of additional debt.


2023 Projected General Fund Revenue





ACCEPTED Materials:

- Air Conditioners
- Appliances Dehumidifiers, heat pumps, water heaters, microwaves, washers, dryers, refrigerators, etc.
- Batteries Auto and Household
- Bicycles Donated to a charity who cleans them up and distributes to those in need
- Bulbs/Fluorescent Tubes, Ballasts, Light Fixtures In original packaging or surrounded by cardboard. DO NOT tape together. Must be dissembled and ballasts disconnected from housing unit.
- Carpet (Rolled)
- Construction Material/Debris/Junk Doors, lumber, fences, tile, sheetrock
- Electronics
- Mattresses, Box Springs, Upholstered Furniture
- Propane Tanks
- Scrap Iron/Metal ALL plastic removed; Tanks/Barrels must be cut in half.
- Tires with or without rims

- COMMERCIAL BUSINESS DROP-OFFS
- CONCRETE

2023 SEASONAL ROAD WEIGHT LIMITS RESTRICTIONS

Each Spring Independence places road restrictions (weight limits) on City streets. Limiting vehicle weight minimizes damage to streets when the frost comes out of the ground which will extend the life of our roads thus reducing the need for early (and costly) reconstruction. Gravel roads are limited to 4-ton per axel and asphalt roads are limited to 5-ton per axel.



Before scheduling any large deliveries, call the City at #763-479-0527 to hear the message or check the website to see if the road restrictions have been lifted.

PROPER PLACEMENT OF CANS WITH SNOW ON THE GROUND

Heavy snow accumulation, icy roads and/or poor visibility during snow removal can make it difficult for snowplows to avoid garbage and recycling cans that are placed alongside the road. Please do not place garbage cans in the roadway. We realize this cleared area is an inviting location to place your cans, but it creates a hazard as they can be hit by vehicles or by snowplows. Most collection trucks are equipped with a hydraulic arm that grasps garbage cans often up to 12 ft away

to be able to always get your properly place cans while on your property and not in the street. It is recommended that garbage cans be placed at least 3 to 5 feet off the edge of pavement (but not on top of snow piles), into your driveway, so they are out of the way of the snowplow while the snowplow is clearing the road. Please keep in mind, the Highway Department is NOT responsible for damaged garbage cans.





PROHIBITED-CONTROL NOXIOUS WEEDS - PREVENTION



The City's <u>Public Nuisances</u> (code 2010.05) prohibits <u>NOXIOUS WEEDS</u>, and staying ahead of them is the best way to avoid frustration for your neighbors and you! HOW TO CONTROL OR ERADICATE: Before they start blooming, cut, disc, plow, or treat with herbicide labeled for the noxious weed to be controlled or eradicated. Repeating control or eradication measures are necessary in order to prevent the ripening and scattering of noxious weed seed or other propagating parts. Planting drought tolerant perennials also helps crowd them out. You can follow <u>MN Board of Water & Soil Resources</u> and utilize expert advice and appendixes found in this <u>Invasive Species Plan</u>. Their <u>Invasive Plants</u> page offers more help. Maple Plain Fire Department 2022 Year in Review

The year 2022 was a busy year for the Maple Plain Fire Department. MPFD responded to 343 incidents in which 4022 hours were logged by fire fighters. The chart to the right is a breakdown of the incident and hours by city served.

Fire fighters not only respond to incidents when 911 is called they also train nearly every Monday night. The trainings include monthly equipment checks, pumper training using water source from hydrants and tanker/ dump tanks; high angle rope rescue, medical scenario's, ice/cold water rescue, warm water rescue, pre plan of commercial properties, crash extrication techniques, live burn training, confined space rescue, weather related incidents, incident command systems, forcible entry techniques, scene safety training, personal protective equipment and several other trainings that fire fighters have to be current on. Firefighters are trained annually to the minimum standard of Emergency Medical Responder (First Responder) with several firefighters advancing in their certifications to EMT and/or Paramedic to better serve each of you."


Additionally, fire fighters participate in numerous community events such as fire prevention seminars with our schools, fire prevention open house, national night out events, fire station tours for many community groups such as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, trick and treat events, area community parades, fixing and repairing equipment and building maintenance. These hours are logged as general attendance hours.


Maple Plain Fire Department currently has 24 paid on call members. They each carry a pager for incident notification. In addition they are notified on their cell phones with incident description and location. In 2022 we had an average 9 firefighters per call responding. As highlighted in the third chart, Incidents are only 54% of the hours served by our dedicated fire fighters.


The 3rd chart shows a breakdown of how many hours were put in by our dedicated Maple Plain firefighters.


The bar graph shows the general trend lines of Incidents over the past 13 years.
