These building projects will create some new educational opportunities for the next generation of students.

As we hear regularly there are some major road detours in the metro area. To my knowledge, the one that will affect us the most will be the closure of Highway 55 from Energy Drive in Rockford to Buffalo most of the summer. U.S. Highway 12 is one of the detour routes. They will be replacing culverts, removing and repurposing all the upper road materials and resurfacing everything. By closing the road they can get the project completed much sooner.

We are still discussing designs for the intersections of County Road 92 and U.S. Highway 12. Depending on "buy in" from the railroad we hope to have a design that is appropriate for years to come rather than another temporary safety feature. County Road 90 and U.S. 12 is moving forward with the "round-about" design.

Money is available for these projects and the hope is that the construction for both projects will be at the same time so that the detour time can be shorter. This is a couple years away.

July 25th-July 27th we will be hosting the Small Cities Council for the National League of Cities. This year I am chairman of that Council. Usually there are approximately 25 to 30 Mayors and Councilmembers present from across the United States. They will be staying at the Grand Stay Hotel in Delano and the meetings will be at our City Hall with other events within and outside the City.

Plan ahead for a "Night to Unite" party in August. Also, we have a State Primary Election in August. This is a very important election because it determines who will be on the ballot in November. This is for state-wide offices like Governor, Attorney General, etc. and you must vote party line only. We have no city election this year.

PUBLIC SAFETY NEWS CHIEF'S DESK

WEST HENNEPIN PUBLIC SAFETY

In the event of an emergency in Maple Plain or Independence you should be aware of two key terms you might be asked to perform by law enforcement or fire departments to protect yourself and others. Those terms are "Shelter in Place" and "Evacuate". You may be asked to perform one of these two tasks for natural disasters such as a tornado, wind events, a winter storm or a biological disaster where hazardous materials are released into the atmosphere from a train derailment or a chemical spill on a county, state or local road.

If you are requested to Shelter in Place or Evacuate it will be broadcasted on local media stations, radio stations and sent directly you by our emergency notification system called CodeRed. If you have not yet signed up for CodeRed I would encourage you to visit our website at www.westhennepin.com and sign up now.

Shelter in Place is a term used to go indoors and stay there. This is a precaution aimed to keep you safe while remaining indoors. This includes if you are at home, work, or at school.

What exactly should you do if told to Shelter in Place?

- Go indoors and stay inside
- Close all outside doors and windows
- When requested turn off all air conditioning, furnaces, fireplaces or ventilation devices that might draw in outside contaminated air
- If possible go to your basement and bring a radio device or cell phone with you
- Listen to your radio or television to get further instructions
- Do not leave your shelter or evacuate unless told to do so
- Keep family and pets inside
- While sheltering in place begin to prepare evacuation items for you, your family, and any pets you may have

What exactly should you do if you are told to evacuate your home due to an emergency?

- First, don't panic and second follow instructions given by emergency managers
- You will have time to pack a few items and secure your home as if you were going on vacation, unless advised otherwise.
- Plan on leaving your home for three days or less
- Close all doors and windows and lock your home
- Place a note on your front door stating you have evacuated and include your name and cell phone number or an emergency contact number for emergency personnel.

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What should I take if I have been asked to evacuate?

 Cash, credit cards, checkbooks and your identification such as a driver license or state ID, and insurance cards

- Prescription medication
- Cell phone and cell phone charging cords, computers or other tablets
- Baby formula and diapers
- Two changes of clothing per person, including jackets, boots, gloves
- Pillows, sleeping bags, and personal hygiene items including towels
- Household pets, leashes, cages, water dish and pet food
- Snacks, water, and other minor food supplies
- Flashlight and batteries

Where do I go after I evacuate?

- You will be instructed to register at a reception center to confirm you have evacuated
- A reception center location will be announced prior to you evacuating
- You are encouraged to stay with friends or relatives outside of the affected area
- You can also stay at an emergency shelter provided by emergency managers and the American Red Cross

By educating our citizens on what to expect in an emergency notification we can ease the stress of the emergency through preparation. By working together and planning for emergencies we can protect lives and property.

Approximately 98 percent of wildfires in Minnesota are caused by humans.

More than 50 wildfires are started each year in Minnesota by campfires that are not completely extinguished, too large or unattended.

Campfire Safety

- Use a fire ring and build your fire at least five feet away from any combustible material.
- Keep a bucket of water nearby to put out the fire.
- Keep a kid-free zone of three feet around the campfire.
- Never leave your campfire unattended.
- Check burning restrictions with the DNR before starting your campfire.

Pre-Register to Vote

If you are a new Independence resident, or did not vote in the last Election, you can preregister to vote now. If you are not yet 18 but will be 18 years old on Election Day, you may also preregister to vote now. Being pre-registered speeds up election day by having your name on the roster of registered voters when you go to vote. Pre-register on-line at https://mnvotes.sos.state.mn.us/VoterRegistration/VoterRegistrationMain.aspx, or stop in at City Hall to pre-register. If you have questions, call the City at 763-479-0527

Absentee Voting

- Absentee Voting for the Primary Election is June 29-August 13
- Absentee Voting for General Election is September 21– November 5

Absentee vote in person

You may cast an absentee ballot in person, at City Hall or at your county auditor's office. City and County offices are open for absentee voting from 10a.m.to 3p.m. on the Saturday before the election and until 5 p.m. on the day before the election.

Absentee Vote by mail

You may have an absentee ballot sent to you by completing and Absentee Ballot Application, available online from Hennepin County: http://www.hennepin.us/residents/elections/preparevote, at City Hall, or at your county's election office. Your ballot will be sent to you when it is ready-starting 46 days prior to the election if you applied for an ab-

Tips for New Voters on Election Day

Go to your polling place (for location, go to www.mnvotes.org)

- You must vote at your assigned polling place
- You have a right to time off work to vote, without losing your pay, personal leave, or vacation time

Sign in or register to vote.

- If you are registered to vote, your name will be on a list of voters. You just need to write your signature next to your name. If you are registered, you do not need to show ID when you sign in.
- If you did not register before Election Day, you must show proof of your current address. You must bring proper ID to register on Election Day. The most common form of ID is a valid Minnesota driver's license, learner's permit or ID. Your ID must have your current Independence address. Go to www.mnvotes.org for ID options.

Vote

- You will vote in a private area, and your vote is secret.
- The ballot instructions will say how many candidates you can choose for each office. Usually it will say to choose one.
- Your ballot will count even if you do not vote on every race or ballot question.
- If you make a mistake, you have a right to ask for a replacement ballot.
