MAYOR JOHNSON'S LETTER

Spring has been long! What appeared to maybe be an early summer ended up being a long spring. I remember many years when all the grain and corn fields were planted by May 1st. Farmers who had cattle usually wait till Mother's Day before putting cattle in the pastures to graze. Every year is different!

Our City Board of Appeals meeting on April 2nd was attended by very few residents. The Hennepin County Assessors that work with our City have done a good job in establishing valuations according to sales and trends. The council recommended only a couple of changes. Ag Landowners and Lake Shore homeowners had the biggest increases in values. We continue to see Minneapolis Commercial Property Values decrease consequently increasing the share of Hennepin County Tax burden with the rest of the county.

April 30th was a bittersweet day for the City when Sergeant Rick Denneson retired from our West Hennepin Public Safety Department after having served us well since October 17, 1988. We wish him "the best" in his retirement. Rick has been selected by the City of Maple Plain to be its next Fire Department Chief, so he will continue to work in public safety in our Cities.

May 27th was Memorial Day. On that morning the Paul Stinson Post American Legion Firing Squad presented arms at the three cemeteries in Independence and at Saints Peter and Paul Cemetery, Loretto. They concluded by hosting a program at Lewis Cemetery, just south of City Hall at 10:30 a.m. This year the keynote speaker was our County Sheriff Witt. Please join the community annually for future ceremonies as we honor deceased veterans.

The 2023 audit report is being finalized for the City. We hope to meet

with the auditors within the month.

Our gravel roads will soon be treated for dust control. We are hoping that they will all be covered at the same time this year. Some of our gravel roads will have culvert replacements and tiling projects done on them.

We have been informed by Representative Robbins that a Minnesota Highway Bill presently includes two million dollars to have an 'environmental study' done on Highway 55 between Hamel and County Road 19, north of Loretto. That is good news because it brings us a step closer to making Highway 55 two lanes each direction going east from Loretto.

As we enter Summer, think about hosting a Night to Unite picnic in your neighborhood. It is a good way to meet your neighbors! (See page 10 for more details.)

All departments of the City are beginning to prepare their budget for the year 2025. It seems early, but the Council has to make an initial decision, a maximum amount, by mid-September. The final levy is approved in December. It can be the same or lowered from the initial September figure.

This Fall is a big election year from the President of the United States all the way down to our City Council and School Boards. Make it a point to know which positions are up for election.

Congratulations to all our High School and College graduates! You have some exciting days ahead and some major decisions to make.

Pioneer Park Improvements—Park Master Plan Concept C-2

The City recently completed an update to the Pioneer Community Park Master Plan following an iterative design and refinement process. The updated plan utilized the original 2007 Vision and Master Plan as the base for making updates and revisions. The City worked with many of the local youth sports organizations to prepare an updated plan that more closely aligns with local needs. In addition, the City integrated new components into the plan such as pickle ball courts and outdoor ice hockey rink. Following completion of the master plan, the City worked to prepare an estimate of costs associated with the development of the park. The City looked at an overall development cost and then also individual amenity costs that were further broken down. The overall cost of the park improvements is approximately \$7,000,000.

The City would like to leverage available park funds to begin construction of park improvements noting that the overall cost is not obtainable at this time. The City has targeted the Hennepin County Youth Sport Facility Grant program as one potential funding mechanism that could leverage a portion the City's funds to realize an initial (Phase I) development project. The City believes that it could obtain matching funding to construct the multi-purpose fields, pickle ball courts and associated site grading and parking lots. The City has also discussed potential partnerships with local sports organizations that are interested in providing funding to support the park development (Orono Youth Baseball, Orono Youth Softball and Orono Westonka Soccer Club). Stay tuned for more information relating to the community park development.

The Intensive Comprehensive Peace Officer Education and Training (ICPOET) Program requires no prior law enforcement experience. The program is designed to recruit candidates looking to transition into the field of law enforcement. Now is the time to change careers and become a licensed police officer for West Hennepin Public Safety Department. You earn a salary while going to school, are provided medical benefits, and school costs are paid for you to join our team.

- ◆ Earn pay and benefits while attending an approved full-time professional peace officer education program in Alexandria, MN or Brooklyn Park, MN.
- Must have a two or four-year <u>regionally accredit-ed</u> college degree in any field of study. No prior law enforcement training or experience is required.
- Must be a U.S. Citizen or eligible to work in the United States under federal requirements.
- No felony convictions and meet all minimum selection standards per <u>State of Minnesota</u> Administrative Rules.
- Upon completion of the education program

(approximately 22 weeks), trainees must attain <u>POST licensure</u> before promoting to a full time sworn police officer position for West Hennepin Public Safety Department.

How the Program Works

Successful candidate will be hired as a probationary police trainee. This is a full-time position with a starting wage of \$25.00 per hour and includes eligibility for medical insurance. As a police trainee, individuals will be paid to attend 40 hours a week of college coursework and training for approximately 22 weeks and then take the licensing exam for police officers. Schooling will be completed at Hennepin Technical College in Brooklyn Park, MN or Alexandria Technical and Community College in Alexandria, MN. In addition to earning a wage, all course fees and equipment are provided and paid for by West Hennepin Public Safety Department. Upon graduation and successful completion of the licensing exam, trainees will be promoted to probationary sworn police officers and begin their career in law enforcement just like any other new officer.

Selection Process

After interviews, background checks, and various pre-employment evaluations, successful selected candidates will be given a job offer and will enroll in the ICPOET Program.

Anticipated Timeline:

June 2024: Interviews

July 2024: Background investigations for top candidates

August 2024: Physical, drug screen, and psychological exams

September/October 2024: Candidates hired (end of September) and classes begin at Alexandria Tech (10/1/24) or Hennepin Tech (10/14/24)



The 2024 Citizens Police Academy concluded their last night of classes with a graduation ceremony at the West Hennepin Public Safety Department on April 4th.

This class concluded the 8-week course that was attended by 15 participants. With the graduation of this year's class, this program has had over 220 participants since its inception in 1999!

The participants learned about traffic enforcement, use of force, narcotics and investigations, court proceedings and prosecution, and several other topics.

Soil Health Discussion

On April 11th, Hennepin County hosted an open house for farmers about cover crops at Independence City Hall. About 20 farmers attended along with county and Farm Service Agency (FSA) staff. Keith Olander the executive director of Ag Centric and Central Lakes College Ag and Energy Center, presented on the economic data his organization has collected on farm profitability. The study is called "Farm Business Management (FBM) data." FBM data summarizes numbers collected from 2.317 farmers across the state across 83 of 87 counties. Farmers that enrolled in the program underwent review of all farm costs - seed, fertilizer, fuel, insur-





ance, labor, etc. and analyzed their results and profitability to see where they landed compared to the rest of farmers that participated.

In a similar but smaller-scale study with 129 farms, FBM data compared financials from farms that grew cover crops versus farms that did not grow cover crops. Data is divided into southern and northern MN regions. The return on investment for cover crops varied depending on what cash crop was grown and generally revealed that cover crops result in slight to moderate decreases in profitability due to the need for up-



front management changes (e.g., equipment, fertilizer, labor). To view the study, you can go to this link to search for the 2023 Cover Crop Report data: https://www.agcentric.org/farm-business-management/annual-fbm-reports/

It should be noted that soil takes a long time to build, and the data only shows the short-term impacts of adopting cover crops as a soil health practice. More information would be needed to understand long term financial impacts of cover crops.

In short, adding cover crops is a highly personal choice for each farmer and there are many economic considerations to take into account. However, Hennepin County has a cost share program available for farmers that are new to trying out cover crops to help offset some of the costs to start up. Payments are on a per-acre basis and are as follows:

Single species, one-year contract: \$35 per acre Multiple species, one-year contract: \$50 per acre Single species, three-year contract: \$45 per acre Multiple species, three-year contract: \$60 per acre

The average family of four spends \$2,500+ on food that goes to waste every year.

ABOUT THE STOP FOOD WASTE CHALLENGE

The Stop Food Waste Challenge is a month-long effort starting August 1 to help you notice when you are wasting food, commit to actions that will have the greatest impact in your household, connect you with helpful resources, and provide support and motivation along the way. Businesses, organizations, and community groups can also join the challenge as Stop Food Waste Challenge part-

COMPOSTING YOURSELF OR USING ORGANICS DROP-OFF AT CITY HALL

Since about one-third of trash is organic materials which could be composted, consider your options to reduce trash and put it to better use:

Compost:

- Yard waste, including grass clippings, plant trimmings and leaves
- Kitchen waste, including fruit and vegetable scraps, coffee grounds, tea bags, and egg shells
- Small amounts of sawdust wood chips, wood ash, and small sticks
- Non-recyclable papers: paper towels, napkins, egg cartons

City Organics Drop-Off:

To begin using the City Hall dropoff location, stop by to register and pick up your organics bags.

When dropping them off, call 763-479-0527, pull up to the gate, and we will open it for you.

Your bag of organics must be carefully placed in the green Organics-Only bin so that it doesn't break.





"SEPTIC SAFE"



"If you would not put it in a compost pile, do not put it down your toilet,"
Shawn Bode, Public Works Director explains.



It might not seem newsworthy, but with new residents moving to a more rural area, some need to be educated that putting shirts, undies, socks, toys, and even "flushable" wipes down the drain creates clogs that are not disintegrating and break the City's lift stations causing residents extra costs in repairs. Those residents could be assessed accordingly.

The myth of flushable wipes

How long does it take for wipes to break down and not damage the sewer system and lift stations?

A: 182 minutes
B: 192 hours / 8 days
C: NEVER!





Did you know that flushing them is like flushing a handkerchief or other item made of cloth? It really is! Flushed wipes cause expensive problems for Public Works staff, who have to clean them out of screens and pumps to remove wipes-based clogs. They also can get caught in your pipes which is expensive for *you* to fix.

Will you do your part and discuss with neighbors if you're on City Sewer?

If you must use wipes, only put wipes in the trash!

Never put anything other than toilet paper down your toilets.

Ready-to-Learn School Supply Collection and Distribution



Vote absentee either in-person at Independence City Hall or vote by mail.

City Hall Absentee Voting - Mondays-Thursdays. 8 am-4:30 pm and Fridays 8 am - noon.

Direct balloting – Beginning Friday, July 26, voters can place their ballot directly into the tabulator.

Extended hours - Saturday, August 10, (9 am-3 pm) and Monday, August 12 (8 am-5 pm)

August 13, 2024 Election Day - Voting Hours 7am-8 pm. Being in line at 8 pm allows you to vote.

Locally, the mayor and (2) council 4-yr term positions are open. Filing dates are July 30. 2024 through August 13, 2024 at 5pm. A \$2 filing fee is due at the time of filing; the withdrawal period ends 5pm, August 15, 2024.

As a new Independence resident or one who did not vote in the last election. you can pre-register to vote until Tues., July 23 at 5pm or online by 11:59pm!

If you are not yet 18 but will be 18 years old on Election Day, you may also pre-register to vote. Being preregistered speeds up Election Day by having your name on the roster of registered voters when you go to vote. Pre-register online at https://
