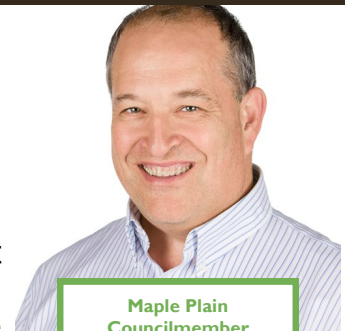

LETTER FROM COUNCILMEMBER MIKE DELUCA

The end of the calendar year brings an opportunity to reflect back on the previous year. And, what a year it has been.

The largest road and infrastructure improvement in the history of Maple Plain finished this spring. I hope you would agree that the new and improved Rainbow and Main Street project looks marvelous. What you might not know is that aging sewer pipes in that area were costing the city a lot of money as ground water would seep into the sewer line, and we were charged for the extra water. By keeping clean water out of the system everyone wins. The infiltration of clean water into our system is significantly lower than prior to the project.

After years of delayed maintenance on our city streets, we implemented our new street maintenance plan and began systematic improvements to the streets. You probably noticed the improvement earlier in the summer on many of the city streets. And, we will responsibly continue these improvements into 2016 and beyond. Cont. p2

LETTER FROM MAYOR JOHNSON (CONTINUED...)

The 2016 budget was finalized at the Council meeting on December 8th. The final figure is \$2,517,559.00 for general City operations and debt service and \$64,270.00 for the Pioneer/ Sarah Creek Watershed district levy. The general levy is nearly 2% lower than what was proposed in September and what appeared on your tax statements this fall.

The major change on tax statements is due to the Delano School District bonds that passed in November. That increase will start on your 2016 taxes and is significant. Hennepin County had proposed a 4.48% increase this year.

Valuation for Independence increased 1.19% this past year compared to 5.23% last year. Commercial and agriculture land dropped a little and housing (except lake properties) remained flat.

Probably before the next newsletter is printed the local 2016 election cycle will have begun. Up for election this year will be all the State Senators and Representatives and U.S. Congress Representatives. Political party caucuses are scheduled for Tuesday, March 1st.

Our City staff, Public Works employees and Public Safety Staff have had a busy year and an excellent safety record. We are fortunate to have such capable and dedicated employees that serve the City with pride. Thank You!

Enjoy the Christmas Season with all its charm, music, family and church gatherings and may 2016 be another good year for us all.

In 2016 we intend to begin improvements on Budd and Main street.

After moving into our new offices at the Discovery Center in 2014, efforts continued this fall on the development of the downtown area. HIGHWAY 12 SAFETY COALITION UPDATE

Over the next 12 months West Hennepin Public Safety Department, MN State Patrol, Wright County Sheriffs Office, Hennepin County Sheriffs Office, Medina Police Department, Orono Police Department, Howard Lake Police Department and all public safety entities within the 38 mile corridor of the Highway 12 Safety Coalition are challenging drivers to Go '12 for 12.'

'Going 12 for 12' simply means that in this Highway 12 corridor, we are asking motorists to have a goal of zero fatal accidents over the next 12 months.

On November 30, 2015, a press conference was held at West Hennepin Public Safety Department with all members of the coalition, the local fire department and law enforcement standing side by side to challenge the public to 'Go 12 for 12'. We've made tremendous strides to improve safety and save lives but people continue to die along Highway 12. Over the past 12 months we have lost six people to unnecessary crashes along Highway 12.

On August 22, 2015, Chelsea Langhans was killed when a driver crossed over the centerline, striking her vehicle head on. Her sister, Liz Squire, addressed the media and members of the Highway 12 Safety Coalition and said, 'No family should have to know how it feels to lose a loved one so suddenly in a crash.'

In order for our communities and family members to stop dying along Highway 12, we must work together to solve this problem. We must slow down, wear our seatbelts and be responsible when driving. We MUST put down the cell phone while driving. 'Going 12 for 12' is going to put additional law enforcement along Highway 12 to prevent people from driving distracted and keep our roads safer.

Other goals of the Highway 12 Safety Coalition include funding for a concrete median barrier along the new Super 2, intersection management through Maple Plain, intersection realignment and a traffic control device at County Road 90 and County Road 92 in Independence.

With all these safety improvements, the Highway 12 Safety Coalition has been in contact with MN-DOT and the funding is simply not there. Senator Osmek and Representative Hertaus have worked with the Highway 12 Safety Coalition. We recently spent time with Transportation Commissioner Zelle to express our need for safety improvements along Highway 12. Senator Osmek and Representative Hertaus will be working with the legislature in the upcoming session to find funding for Highway 12 safety improvements.

I want the citizens and our community members to know that West Hennepin Public Safety is committed to making Highway 12 safer for all of us. Together we can work to reduce the number of fatal crashes along Highway 12 along with our partners in MN-DOT, Hennepin and Wright County and our elected officials. TOILETS ARE NOT TRASHCANS!

Flushable Wipes Not Flushable!

Public Works would like to send out a reminder to please not flush “flushable wipes”! Disposable wipes which are essentially baby wipes designed for adults are wreaking havoc on sewer systems nationwide. The majority of the wipes don’t biodegrade quickly enough to avoid clogging sewer pipes. Many cities across the world are in lawsuits with wipes manufacturers and are demanding clear labeling of the products. Even a few flushed wipes can create a blockage for a single home resulting in an expensive service call to have the drain snaked. Municipal sewer systems are only able to handle items that break down relatively easily so even a few homes flushing wipes can result in a very expensive breakdown for cities. **Side note: please do not dump grease in the kitchen sink as this also causes sewer problems!**

What to do with Unwanted Medicine!

Do you have prescriptions you no longer need or perhaps a bottle of cough syrup you want to throw away? Maybe you have over the counter medicine or prescriptions that have expired and wonder what is the proper way to dispose of them? The old advice was to flush them down the toilet or throw them in the trash but it has been proven that medicines flushed down the drain can contaminate our lakes and streams and ends up in our drinking water! Doing this also hurts fish and other aquatic wildlife! Municipal systems cannot remove medications from the water. Following are places you may dispose of medications safely:

- **Check with your pharmacy**— as of 2015 new regulations allow them to collect

RECYCLING TO BE REQUIRED IN COMMERCIAL BUILDINGS IN 2016

In 2014, the Minnesota Legislature expanded recycling requirements to include commercial buildings. Owners with commercial buildings in the seven-county metro area –that also generate four cubic yards or more of trash per week – must be recycling at least three materials by January 1, 2016.

Who must collect recycling? Property owners with commercial buildings (including multi-family buildings) located in Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott or Washington counties.

What must be collected? A minimum of three broad materials must be collected for recycling. Possible material types include paper, cans, glass, plastic, metal, cardboard or organics. Single-sort recycling collection with 3+ materials included meet the requirement.

EAGLE PROJECT IN PIONEER PARK



Those of you who have explored the back part of Pioneer Park may have noticed a new 'Nature walk' kiosk. This is part of the long range plans to add trails and a boardwalk to the wetlands surrounding Pioneer Creek.

The Kiosk provides visitors with the opportunity to learn more about the birds, animals and trees around the park. Other posted information, a small library of books, and a treasure hunt based on what can be found in the park are also in the kiosk.

Several bird, bat, and duck houses were placed near the kiosk and river as well. Families of blue-birds and wrens inhabited the birdhouses within the first week and a chickadee claimed a duck house as its own.

You'll also find newly planted trees that tolerate wetland or floodplain conditions, such as River Birch, Willow, Red Maple and Hackberry. In all, 82 trees were planted this spring.

The kiosk and the trees were planted as part of an Eagle Project by Martin Eichers, of Boy Scout Troop 273 from Delano. Martin is completing his Eagle Scout requirements and hopes to achieve this goal in the coming weeks.

WHPS ANNOUNCES THE 2016 POLICE ACADEMY

West Hennepin Public Safety's 2016 Citizens Police Academy will start on February 18, 2016, and will end with graduation on April 7, 2016. The Academy runs for eight weeks, one day a week, Thursday nights, from 7 –10 p.m.

The **Citizens Academy is a FREE 24-hour block of instruction, sponsored by the Crime Fund**, designed to give citizens knowledge about how your public safety department operates, our policies, procedures, programs and challenges. In addition, you will be introduced to government officials and staff and learn about the responsibilities of their respective office.

The Citizens Police Academy was designed to create a better understanding of law enforcement through education. The Citizens Police Academy participants are presented with realistic hands on information, which will help each participant better understand the police department functions. The classroom and hands on information covers: **DWI and traffic enforcement, home security, use of deadly force, which includes a demonstration of the Taser gun and FATS training (firearms simulation), Hennepin County Dispatch Center, court procedures including testifying before a Judge, K-9 demonstration, narcotics investigations** and many other areas related to law enforcement. This is a great opportunity to meet your peace officers, fellow citizens, and other members of government to learn why we do what we do. At graduation you will receive a certificate and become a member of the Citizens Academy Alumni network.



We believe an informed citizenry will enhance public safety, make better decisions about how to protect themselves and their business, understand law enforcement strategies to problem-solving and provide leadership to other areas of government. This class is a must for those people who live or work within West Hennepin Public Safety Department's jurisdiction, but is open to citizens from around the area. Independence Weir Replaced

On Saturday morning October 10, 2015, the outlet control (weir) on the west side of lake Independence was replaced under MN DNR permit #2014-0199. The project was completed entirely with local talent and volunteers saving the community several thousands of dollars. The cost of the project will be shared by the cities of Independence and Medina, Three Rivers Park District, and the Pioneer Sarah Creek Watershed District.

The weir, located under the bridge on Independence Road, is a wooden dam structure previously installed in 1977, which was worn and damaged. It was scheduled to be repaired following the recent outlet channel restoration that was completed in 2014.

The top boards of the weir were replaced with two 25' long 3" thick white oak planks (each weighing about 150 #) custom cut by Timm's Lumber & Sawing (County Rd 6) and covered by a custom made 3/16" plate steel cover formed by Schoening (County Road 90). All components were welded and prepared by Larry Ende, City of Independence Public Works Director.

The new weir was installed by Larry Ende (Director - Independence Public Works), Joe Baker (Pioneer Sarah Creek Watershed Commissioner), Derek Spencer (Delano Troop 273 Eagle Scout), Mike Peterson, and Brad Spencer (Independence City Councilmember). To earn this rank, a Boy Scout must progress through six levels of rank and earn 21 merit badges. They also need to serve six months in a troop leadership position; plan, develop, and give leadership to a service project for any religious organization or school or community; take part in a Scoutmaster conference; and successfully complete an Eagle Scout board of review.

WINTER SNOWPLOWING REMINDERS!

When the snow flies, Maple Plain and Independence Public Works mobilize to provide you with a clear path to get to work, to the store, or to your favorite winter activity destination.

How much snow is needed before the plows begin?

Two inches of continual snow fall, drifting snow, or unsafe road conditions due to ice or freezing rain.

What is our snow removal policy for sidewalks, trail ways, bikeways and walkways for residents and businesses?

Snow and ice must be removed from public sidewalks, trail ways, bikeways and walkways 12 hours after snow has ceased to fall.

What if my mailbox is damaged during the snow removal?

Even under the best of circumstances and extreme care on the part of plow operators, damage to mailboxes due to snow plowing is possible. However, the City is only responsible if damage to a mailbox is the result of being struck by the plow blade, wing or other piece of equipment. Damage caused by snow or ice is the responsibility of the property owner. Replacement policy details are available by contacting City Hall and maximums do apply.

Any final advice on making this a safe winter season?

Please provide snowplow operator's enough room to maneuver the equipment. Due to the size of these vehicles, it may not always be possible for operators to see vehicles following too closely; so be sure to leave a safe distance and always pass a snowplow with extreme care.

Will snow plow operators clear off my driveway?

The City's first priority is to clear the streets as efficiently as possible. Snowplow operators recognize the inconvenience of a plugged driveway and so they make every attempt to minimize these occurrences. Unfortunately, this is not always possible.

Snow removal reminder

Minnesota State Law and local ordinances prohibit the deposit of snow in any way on public streets. Please help keep our roads safe for all. Depositing snow onto a public road can result in a misdemeanor. Help keep our roads safe and City equipment intact.

WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS

Between **November 1 and April 15** of each year, no vehicle shall be left standing or parked between 1 a.m. and 7 a.m. on any street, state highway, or county road within the Maple Plain city limits. West Hennepin Public Safety is permitted to ticket and tow all vehicles, at the owner's expense, in violation of the city's parking ordinance.
