Our budget went up primarily to fund capital expenditures rather than bonding as well as increasing our cash reserve balance. Variations on individuals taxes will change depending on what happened to your home valuation, what school district you're in, farm land valuation and law changes, etc. Hennepin County and special districts have increased their levies too.

During the next year we will be asking for more input on our 2040 City Comprehensive Land Use Plan. I hope we can count on you! It needs to be completed by the end of next year.

Because our Representative Hertaus and Senator Osmek were able to get some designated funding for U. S. Highway 12 road improvements approved at the Legislature last year, we have had a series of meetings with other entities reviewing several engineering designs for County Road 92 and Highway 12. The railroad, wetlands, private property, road curves, reducing intersections, future growth and limited dollars are some of the factors that are being considered. Hopefully by early spring we can have enough information that we can hold an "open house" and receive public comments. Hennepin County becomes the main "banker" in this project.

Hopefully this will be a good Holiday Season for you and your family. Likewise I wish the best for us all in 2018

NEW Seasonal Parking Restrictions Are in Effect!

(Ordinance No. 2017-06)

From November 1 through April 15 of each year and between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. following a snow fall of two inches or more in depth, it shall be unlawful to park or permit to be parked, or continue to park or permit to stand, any vehicle upon any city street until the snow has been plowed from the street or the same has been otherwise disposed of.

West Hennepin Public Safety announces the 2018 Citizens Police Academy

West Hennepin Public Safety has announced the dates for the 2018 Citizens Police Academy. The Citizens Police Academy will start on February 15, 2018 and will end with graduation on April 5, 2018. The Academy runs for eight weeks, one day a week, Thursday nights, from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 pm.

WHAT IS IT?

The Citizens Academy is a **FREE** 24-hour block of instruction, sponsored by the Crime Fund, designed to give citizens knowledge about how your public safety department operates, our policies, procedures, programs and challenges. In addition, you will be introduced to government officials and staff and learn about the responsibilities of their respective office. Participants in each session will commit to meeting 3 hours, one night a week for 8 weeks.

The Citizens Police Academy was designed to create a better understanding of law enforcement through education. The Citizens Police Academy participants are presented with realistic hands on information, which will help each participant better understand the police department functions. The classroom and hands on information covers: DWI and Traffic Enforcement, home security, personal security, use of force, including deadly force which includes a demonstration of the Taser Gun and FATS training (firearms simulation), Hennepin County Dispatch Center, Court procedures including testifying before a Judge and many other areas related to law enforcement.

This is a great opportunity to meet your police officers, fellow citizens, and other members of government to learn why we do what we do. At graduation you will receive a certificate and become a member of the Citizens Academy Network Alumni.

WHY SHOULD I ATTEND?

We believe an informed citizenry will enhance public safety, make better decisions about how to protect themselves and their business, understand law enforcement strategies to problem-solving and provide leadership to other areas of government.

This class is a must for those people who live or work in or near the West Hennepin Public Safety Department's jurisdiction. The West Hennepin Public Safety Department is currently establishing a list of participants who would be interested in the next class. The recommended attendee age is 18 years and older. New City Ordinance: 2017-06

Please note it is unlawful to dump, plow or push snow from private driveways onto highway or city streets whether you are plowing your driveway or have hired someone to

remove snow. Snow dumped on highways or street right-of-way can create a hazard not only for motorists, but also for snowplows. Even heavy snowplows have been ditched and damaged when hitting compacted and frozen snow. The person responsible for depositing snow on roadways may be liable in a civil lawsuit if damages or injuries occur as a result of this action. Under MN Statutes, Chapter 160.2715, RIGHT-OF-WAY USE, violation of the above statute is a misdemeanor, city ordinance 2017-06 states from November 1 through April 15 of each year and between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. following a snow fall of two inches or more in depth, it shall be unlawful to park or permit to be parked, or continue to park or permit to stand, any vehicle upon any city street until the snow has been plowed from the street or the same has been otherwise disposed of.

Note to Residents with City Sewer: State law limits City responsibility for sewer back-ups because the City does not have exclusive control of the City's sanitary sewer system. Damage can occur to homes and property for which the City will not be legally liable. As a result, a prudent homeowner may wish to discuss purchasing additional coverage with their homeowner's insurance carrier/ agent.

<u>DO NOT</u> put paper products such as paper towels, moist towelettes, tissue, handy wipes, disposable towels, diapers, sanitary napkins, condoms, and feminine products down the drain. **The only paper that should be flushed is toilet paper.**

Kitchen solids, such as fruit and vegetable rinds and peels, corn kernels, eggshells, and chicken bones can also cause blockage. Garbage disposals do not always reduce some of these items to the point that they will flush clear of the lateral lines.

<u>DO NOT</u> dump cooking grease and oils down the drain. Flushing out the grease with hot water will not work either; this only causes a build up further down the drain and eventually contributes to a stoppage in the lateral or sewer pipes. Avoid using chemicals that claim to dissolve grease, such as vinegar and baking soda. Those products only dislodge grease clogs and move them further down the pipe, which can lead to similar problems. To dispose of cooking grease, pour it into a heat-resistant container, and allow it to cool and set. That container should then be disposed in the regular garbage.
